### NUMBER ONE PROBLEM WITH SMALL BOATS...CAPSIZING AND FALLS OVERBOARD

The formula and skills needed to keep the boat upright are quite simple: Keep your shoulders inside the gunwales of the boat while keeping your weight as low as possible. Disrupt either of these two factors and the odds of capsizing your boat or falling overboard are increased. Remember it is the action of people that cause capsizing and falls overboard on small open boats like utility boats, john boats, canoes and kayaks. Learning balance and movement skills under controlled conditions can make outings more fun and reduce the risk of mishap. Wearing your life jacket will give the extra margin of safety for when accidents caused by others or outside forces, such as the wakes of other boats happen. Small open boats can easily be safely operated and will provide hours of enjoyment on the water. It is up to you to stay in the boat, upright and dry. 🚤

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
